Computing

The students began with a simple car design, assembling their creations with precision and teamwork. Once their vehicles were constructed, they turned their attention to programming, using coding blocks to bring their robots to life. The task involved making their cars move forward, turn, and navigate toward the finish line.

Pupils were able to link their knowledge of the suffragette movement to a statue that retains evidence of the damage caused when removing a chained suffragette.

The early afternoon was spent in workshops to understand, prepare and present parliamentary petitions. Mrs Clark had helped to ready the pupils for this through debating practise in the previous week.




