This year, as a team, we are focusing on three areas for our professional development: adaptive approaches, wellbeing, and leadership. To begin the year, we felt it was important that all staff shared the same wellbeing input.

As part of our training with Adrian Bethune, we were reminded that children often learn more from what adults model than from what we say (Prof. Alison Gopnik). One of the healthy habits we are now building into daily life at Hazelwood is taking time for a walk in the woods.

These walks are not only for moments of stress, but a regular way of keeping balance, maintaining energy, and showing pupils that wellbeing is something to protect every day. Research shows that even ten minutes of movement outdoors can have measurable benefits for long-term health (Prof. James Woodcock).

You may notice staff taking short or longer walks during the day. Please be reassured that children's safety and supervision always come first. By living these habits ourselves, we also hope to show our pupils that small, consistent steps — like fresh air and movement — really do add up to a healthier, happier life.

Thank you for all your support at the start of this academic year. Our staff development programme makes me even more positive about the year ahead and how it aligns with our culture and vision, enabling us to deliver the very best for the children. I am looking forward to a wonderful 2025–2026 with our Hazelwood community.

WHAT DO YOU LOVE MOST ABOUT YOUR JOB?

HOW DO YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO CHILDREN'S LIVES?

By focusing on two key areas: creating a secure and loving environment and fostering their natural curiosity and independence. First to focus on building strong and trusting relationship. When children feel safe and cared for, they have the confidence to explore, take risks, and learn. I ensure my room is a place where every child feels seen, heard and valued. This is achieved through consistent routines, warm interactions and by taking time to understand each child's unique needs and personality. Second, I make a difference by moving beyond simply entertaining children and instead, empowering them to become more independent thinkers.

WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FORWARD TO THIS YEAR?

Leading a new group of children through their developmental journey and implementing new, creative learning initiatives within my room. I am excited about the fresh start of the new group of children and it's a privilege to be a part of their lives during such a crucial stage.


The Reading Roots Team has started!

Blossom

The children have been exploring objects that move in different ways. They have enjoyed putting balls into the ball drop box and playing with different ICT vehicles. The children have been creative and moving different vehicles to make coloured marks on the paper and making their own ball shaped sun catcher. In the messy tray they have been playing with boats in water and exploring pasta with spoons and bowls. The children really enjoyed playing in the ball pit and throwing all the balls everywhere.

The children have also been exploring different dinosaur activities. They have been playing with the coloured chia seeds with big dinosaurs and finding dinosaurs hidden in sand and natural materials. They have enjoyed being messy this week by doing some feet painting and decorating a pair of jeans. The children have been exploring different shape sorters and stackers. We have also been moving our bodies different nursery rhyme music. The children have enjoyed exploring their new garden and playing with the big blocks and diggers.







Maple

The last few weeks in the Maple classroom have been wonderfully busy! We recently centred our activities around the theme of 'Peter Rabbit,' which the children absolutely loved. A highlight of this theme was creating our own paper plate rabbits, and everyone had a great time with it! We also took advantage of the lovely weather by spending time outdoors, enjoying many books together. This week, we dove into our new theme, 'Old Macdonald.' The children are having a blast with animal printing and pretending to milk a cow in the garden!









Willow

We've had a wonderful start to the new term in Willow! Despite a few wobbles along the way, the children have settled in nicely. Last week, we enjoyed exploring "Dear Zoo," matching up tigers and discovering different textures like grass, corrugated card, and fluffy materials. The little artists have been having a great time playing musical instruments while singing songs too! We've also had fun using paint to create dogs, lions, and frogs. This week, our focus is on "Amazing Aeroplanes," where we're using more paint to print aeroplanes and have made and decorated a hot air balloon!







Elm

In Elm last week, we welcomed all the children into their second week. We are incredibly proud of how well they have adapted to the routine and built relationships with their new key person and the peers. Our topic last week was family, and the children brought in family photos to share. They talked about who each person was, and these photos are now displayed on our family board, much to the delight of the children, who enjoyed showing them to their friends.

This week, our focus has shifted to Elmer the Elephant and his array of colours. We have explored various Elmer stories and engaged in some Elmer-themed colouring activities. On Wednesday, we celebrated Jeans for Genes Day, and the children did a fantastic job wearing denim jeans.

Looking ahead to next week, we will be discussing "Goldilocks and The Three Bears" as well as other fairy tales. We will revisit our "Three Bear Behaviour Code" and explore the different characters from these stories.









Birch

What an amazing and busy first few weeks the children have had in Birch, they have loved exploring their new room and different areas within the nursery such as the library where they hunted for Goldilocks and the Three Bears book and exploring the playground where they enjoyed climbing on different apparatus and exploring the bikes and scooters. Birch have been looking at their family photos and talking about who is in their family and whether they have any pets or not, they have also been exploring different messy play resources such as shaving foam and making porridge for the bears too. Throughout the week, we have had many activities based around Goldilocks and the Three Bears, the children enjoyed a teddy bears picnic at snack time and have also been making bears with bubble paint, we have also had matching and sorting the compare bears as well as counting the bears too. The children have taken part in Jeans for Genes day where they were able to come into nursery wearing as much denim as they could find and taking part in colourful painting activities as well as a fun and colourful music lesson with Mrs Fryer.







Hazel

Hazel is our new room and we're thrilled to share how well the children are settling in. During the first week, our focus was on making the Hazel children feel comfortable and familiar with their surroundings, as well as introducing them to their key person. In the second week, we encouraged the children to talk about their families, fostering a sense of belonging. They created a wonderful display by sticking family pictures onto a nest, which was a lovely way for them to connect with each other. Also, we've been exploring shapes and colours! The children had a fantastic time printing shapes using potatoes. We also took them on a shape hunt on the grass, which was both fun and educational. As part of the nursery's 'Jeans for Genes Day', the children used different coloured paint for handprints and fingerprints as well as mixing two colours to create a new one. It's been a delightful few weeks filled with creativity and learning!









Pine

The children in Pine class have made a seamless transition into their new room. Every child seems confident and secure, already forging close bonds with key staff and establishing new friendships. To highlight personal, social and emotional development we have concentrated upon self-identity, families, feelings, emotions and what makes us unique. Every child has created a marvellous self-portrait to hang proudly in the room, with some children creating paper plate representations of their facial features too. Each child collated an 'All About Me' photo album too, which sparked plenty of fabulous language as they explained which relatives were in each photo. This theme was extrapolated to include discussions on our feelings and emotions during circle time and whilst at play in the tuff tray. The visual aid of 'The Colour Monster' books and puppets helped those children who found it difficult to express their thoughts verbally. The 'small world' table not only provided a backdrop for imaginative play, but also an opportunity to match numerals to amounts of family members. Allocated music, swimming, ballet and Forest School sessions have enhanced the children's excitement, development and learning even further this week too.

Acorns

The children on the Acorn side of the Forest class have enjoyed the start to the new academic year. They seem settled and confident and always ready to take full advantage of the activities on offer in the room. Our initial theme of 'All about me' has provided the children an opportunity to think about what makes them similar, and different, from their peers. This has been reinforced by each child painting a self-portrait, carefully selecting the correct colours for their eyes and hair. The creation of our individual 'All about me' photo albums has further highlighted our sense of family and instigated plenty of dialogue as the children fondly discuss which relatives are in the photos.

This week we have extended the theme to also encompass feelings and emotions, using simple adjectives to describe how we are feeling during group time. 'The Colour Monster' books, colouring templates and puppets have provided an invaluable prop to help the children describe their feelings by linking them to different colours.

The children's learning experience has further been enriched with separate music, ballet, Forest School and swimming sessions...a great start to the term!

The Reception children have enjoyed exploring their classrooms and are settling in happily to their new routines.












The BOX



It has been great getting back into the outdoors with Gary, even through some rainy spells!










History & Reading Buddies

The Children's Book Project - Christmas Collection

We are again running the collection of new and nearly new (but in very good condition) books for the Children's Charity in the run up to Christmas.

Across London and the UK 1 in 4 disadvantaged children owns fewer than 10 books, whilst 1 in 8 has none at all. This has an impact not only on these children's academic outcomes but also on their wellbeing, emotional development and sense of themselves as a reader.

The Children's Book Project directly tackles this 'book gap' and gifts donated books to targeted communities across the Capital. These schools and community groups put on celebratory book gifting events at which children are invited to choose a book to take it home and keep. The charity expects to gift upwards of 70,000 books this year.
