Celebrating recent highlights at Hazelwood

Dear Parents,

20TH JUNE 2025

On Friday 13th June, Year 3 celebrated Hazelwood's history, and I led an assembly with Years 7 and 8 on the same theme. Today, I'm sharing part of that assembly with you:

Let me introduce you to Ruth Bourne. Though her husband, Edward Baily, is credited as Hazelwood's founder, Ruth's influence was just as vital. She was thoughtful, funny, bold—and she wrote everything down. Her diaries are a remarkable insight into the late 1800s, when Hazelwood was still an idea.

She wrote about everyday frustrations and triumphs: annoying governesses, schoolwork, tennis matches, and dreams for the future. At 17, she reflected:

"Now I am at an age when I get caught up in this world's pleasures and vanities... I must not waste a minute in not improving myself in some way."

She was starting to ask the questions many of you are asking now:

- Who do I want to be?
- How do I deal with pressure?
- Where do I belong?

Ruth helped choose Hazelwood's site, oversaw its opening, and paid attention to every detail. After a long day preparing the school, she wrote:

"There were 1000 details to consider but all the servants worked well and carried out all my plans faultlessly... Edward and I felt more than fully rewarded for all our trouble and work."

She loved the humour and chaos too. After a dramatic school play, she noted:

"Clive acted the best and made a very decided and commanding Queen... Furiana... is better but not furious enough."

And the pupils? Just as lively as today's:

"The boys were riotous during preparation... Edward stopped their half day and dancing."

Still, Ruth was proud of what Hazelwood could become. She believed in it—even when there were doubts: "Poor Edward very down in the mouth... it seems to be on his mind that the new house will be a failure."

But they persevered. Because they believed what they were building mattered. And they were right. Hazelwood has always been more than bricks—it's people. People who care, show up, work hard, and lift others. Now, you are part of that story.

Every time you help a friend, lead with kindness, or show quiet strength, you shape this school.

One of my favourite lines of Ruth's comes at the end of a term:

"Our home at Hazelwood is a palace of contentment and cheerfulness... Our aim and object is to try and make all those in our keeping good and happy."

What a beautiful legacy.

Wrens

The wrens have had an incredibly busy month! We have been observing the growth of our butterflies, feeding them, and then releasing them. The wrens have also been diving into fairytales, with each day bringing a new story for the children to explore. We've crafted pigs and wolves using forks, and the children have enjoyed using a variety of materials to create their own crowns. We have also made our own ducks using feathers and glue, as well as making a big house out of cardboard.







Starlings

Starlings have had a super fun filled 2 weeks! For the first week we have explored 'the little raindrop' creating our own raindrops from different blue materials, a rainbow was made by the class using glue and tissue paper, coloured cellophane was used to make individual kites for our window as well as lots more! They have been playing with play dough using different tools, pouring and scooping and lots of dressing up.

We are exploring 'Each Peach Pear Plum' this week learning about different types of fruit and vegetables, making yummy plum pies with different materials, making porridge with oats and pouring and scooping water. Starlings have also been practising their counting with plums and peach, colour matching with bears and absolutely loved throwing a coloured dice to guess the colours.









Wagtails

The wagtails have had so much fun learning about pirates. They have been doing lots of pirate creative activities, such as making pirate hats, telescopes and a pirate map. The children have been exploring the desert island with boats on the messy tray and playing with boats in the water tray. We have also been playing in our own pirate ship on the climbing frame and having our very own pirate dress up day. We have also been singing lots of different pirate songs.

We have been looking at the story of the three bears and listening to the story. The children have made their own bear head bands and made our own bear rice cakes using honey and bananas. The wagtails have been exploring lots of coloured water play in the garden and making their own bear porridge in the messy tray.







Lower Robins

This week in Lower Robins, the children have been discussing the story of the Rainbow Fish. They have enjoyed creating jellyfish with Gem A and counting fish with Nic. Our letter of the week was 'l', and the children had fun exploring various objects that begin with that sound.

Last week, our topic was 'Holidays'. We encouraged the children to bring in photos from their holidays to display on our board in the home corner. The children have loved sharing their pictures and discussing where they went and what activities they enjoyed.

Next week, we will focus on the letter sound 'h', and our theme will be pirates.









Upper Robins

Over the past couple of weeks, we've been exploring the theme of holidays, with a special focus on Summer this week! The children have really embraced a range of fun activities around this exciting topic. During circle time, they enjoyed sharing their holiday photos with their friends and looked at their favourite holiday destinations on the world map. In the tuff tray, they had a great time experimenting with textures by making their own ice cream using colourful shaving foam and sprinkles. They also planted sunflower seeds, counted coins in our pretend travel agency, and chose their next holiday by browsing through holiday brochures and picking out holiday clothes.

Additionally, they loved splashing around in the paddling pool, staying cool while engaging in enjoyable water play, and learning about the importance of wearing sunscreen. This theme has been a fantastic way to celebrate the season!







Skylarks Orange

The children have thoroughly enjoyed the past two weeks, during which we engaged in a delightful activity centred around the famous rhyming book "Squash and Squeeze." This charming story features a little lady who fills her home with an array of farm animals. In our classroom, we created a pigsty, and our small world area was transformed into a farm complete with sheep, pigs, goats, and horses. The children relished using their imaginations to enhance their play together.

Additionally, we had a wonderful outing to Bocketts Farm, where the children had the opportunity to feed and pet various animals and even get to see the pigs racing in a very exciting pig race We also took a lovely walk around the allotment, which is home to a variety of fruits and vegetables. During our stroll, we were fortunate to spot bugs, caterpillars, ladybirds, and even a few snails.







Skylarks Green

We drew our 'Gardening' topic to a conclusion in Skylarks' Green with some 'hands-on', exploratory play in our tuff tray garden, investigating the variety of seeds found in fruits and vegetables, and by growing cress, carrot heads, parsley, and coriander, all of which grew successfully under the watchful eye of the children.

For our next theme, we entered the exciting world of 'Jungles'. The children spotted animals through binoculars in our rainforest role play area and practised their number recognition against the backdrop of the tiger-striped tuff tray. Some children showed great skill and concentration as they cut out spiral snakes to hang in our role play area and the whole class joined in to identify different animals simply from their patterned skin. After introducing the popular 'Handa's Surprise' story to complement this topic, the children thoroughly enjoyed tasting the exotic fruits from the book and registering their favourite on a pictogram. This introduced them to ways of logging data and information in an age-appropriate way.

Our trip to Bocketts Farm was a fantastic, memorable day! The children all behaved well and interacted sensibly with our tour guide as she introduced us to calves, lambs, chickens, alpacas, goats and piglets. We enjoyed a tractor ride around the farm and cheered on our favourite pig during the afternoon 'pig race'. It was a great day full of learning, fun, adventure, and excitement in equal measure.

This week we start our 'Dinosaur' theme...another subject that never fails to capture the children's imagination...

Pizza Express Trip

Reception pupils enjoyed a tasty trip to Pizza Express last week!

They have been looking at past and modern kitchens, and today their focus was on commercial kitchens and exploring the local area.

They discussed the process of making pizza, including the ingredients in the dough and the changes that occur during cooking.

They examined the fire oven used for baking and observed the large tin opener in action, noting how it differs from the smaller tin opener that is typically used at home.







Forest School

Reception had a productive morning in the woods building homes for their Bog Babies. Having learnt about migrating birds who have been making their summer homes in the UK, they built homes constructed from natural materials. The children learnt, through trial and error, how to make a strong and stable structure, what materials animals use to keep themselves warm and dry, as well as the power of collaborative planning and execution. Once the homes were built and Bog Baby Village was complete, we took a drier-than-usual walk through the bog to notice any changes since our last (decidedly wetter) visit.













Nature Hunt

Year 1 went on a colourful adventure around the Hazelwood site, hunting for natural items to match the colours of the rainbow. We discovered some amazing treasures in all sorts of shades!

As we sorted through our collections, we noticed something interesting — no one had found anything naturally blue. So the search is not over yet... we are still on the lookout for that elusive bit of blue in nature!



Swimming

Our talented swimmers recently represented Hazelwood School at the prestigious IAPS National Swimming Finals 2025, and what a fantastic display of skill, determination, and teamwork it was!

The U13 Girls Medley Relay team, comprising Scarlett, Esme, Flo, and Elisha, put in a superb performance, finishing 9th overall with a time of 1:07.81. This amazing effort saw them shave a remarkable 6 seconds off their personal best and improve their previous seeding by 2 placings – a testament to their synchronized efforts!

Esme also shone in the 50m Breaststroke, securing an impressive 3rd place with a time of 36.44. Her fantastic swim not only earned her a medal but also saw her improve her personal best by 3.5 seconds and move up 3 placings.

Our U12 Boys Medley Relay team, consisting of Sam, Campbell, Raif, and Ben powered to a 13th place finish with a time of 1:10.06. This was a truly outstanding performance, with the boys knocking a phenomenal 7 seconds off their personal best and improving their original seeding by 3 placings!

In the individual events, Sam B took on the 50m Fly, clocking a time of 38.10 for 19th place. He showed great consistency, equalling his previous best placement and improving his personal best by 1.5 seconds.

Campbell competed in the 50m Breaststroke, finishing 11th with a time of 40.69. A strong performance that saw him improve his placing by 3 spots!

Please note that the condition of books donated is very important. The charity cannot accept old, marked or tatty books since these are not suitable to gift onwards to another child. so please do not send any of the following:


