Celebrating recent highlights at Hazelwood

Dear Parents,

21ST MARCH 2025

It is with immense pride that we celebrate 135 years of our school's history—a legacy built on dedication, resilience, and an enduring commitment to education. As we reflect on the journey that has brought us here, it is heartwarming to revisit the words of those who laid the foundation of this institution, shaping it into the beacon of learning and character it is today.

When the school first opened its doors, the excitement was palpable. As one account from September 22, 1890, captures: "The opening of the first Hazelwood term!! Of course, Edward and I felt very festive and excited... The boys were immensely taken with the place and there was no homesickness." It is reassuring to know that from the very beginning, our school was a home away from home, fostering a sense of belonging and camaraderie that continues today.

Education at our school has always been about more than just books and lessons. The early years saw a mix of rigorous study, deep friendships, and, of course, the occasional lighthearted moment. One delightful entry from July 26, 1892, recounts a historic cricket match: "The whole neighbourhood came, even old Fanny Kemble came and looked on in her carriage and was rather horrified at seeing ladies playing cricket." Even then, we were breaking barriers and embracing progress—something we continue to strive for today.

The commitment to excellence was evident even in the smallest details. One diary entry from December 17, 1894, beautifully expresses the mission that remains at our core: "Our aim and object is to try and make all those in our keeping good and happy, and I think we are succeeding slowly and surely." This dedication to nurturing young minds and hearts has remained unwavering throughout our history.

Of course, the school's success has always been rooted in the relationships that define us. A humorous yet heartfelt moment from February 2, 1892, captures this perfectly: "I organised a new plan for enabling all the boys to brush their teeth in the evening as the dentists made such a point of it nowadays." Even in matters of dental hygiene, the care and attention to students' well-being were paramount!

And then there were the moments of shared joy, like the Henley Regatta in 1880: "I was really proud of the Eton boys, and I don't think I ever felt so delighted in my life... We could hardly drag ourselves along, as we were so dreadfully tired, but it was the pleasantest Henley we have experienced yet." The sense of school spirit and togetherness, whether on the playing fields or in the classroom, has been a defining thread across generations.

As we mark this incredible milestone, we celebrate not only our history but also the vibrant community that continues to uphold these traditions. The laughter, the friendships, the hard work, and the enduring commitment to education—these are the things that make our school special. We stand on the shoulders of those who came before us, and we look forward to carrying this legacy forward for generations to come.

#### WHAT DO YOU LOVE MOST ABOUT YOUR JOB?

I enjoy working with the children and staff looking at ways to develop and improve on our already fantastic facilities across both sites – whether it's building a new activity playground for the lower school, flexible classrooms in the Ruth Bourne Building, or improving our reception area and classrooms at the nursery, it is a joy to see their faces when the project is complete.

#### WHAT MOTIVATES YOU?

It is so rewarding seeing the children enjoying their school life. I remember when I started at Hazelwood, I looked out my window at the outdoor box. There was a lesson being taught and I thought to myself "what a fantastic way for our children to start their learning journey". I hope that I can play a part in creating so many happy memories of the children's time at Hazelwood.

#### HOW DO YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO CHILDREN'S LIVES?

Part of my role is of course about providing a safe and secure environment for the children – this is paramount, but I was recently asked to run an elective about project management which meant I got to know some of the children, rather than working in the background. It was a pleasure to teach a small group of Year 7 children how to design and project manage a refurbishment project. They focussed on the dining hall, and it was brilliant seeing their ideas evolving over the six weeks, and of course seeing the presentation they did for Steve and Charlotte from the Catering Service – I have in fact used some of their ideas!

#### WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FORWARD TO THIS YEAR?

I will be teaching another group of children next term so I am looking forward to getting to know them - it is such fun to hear their views and for them to suggest ways that they feel they can improve areas around the school. Also, with another busy summer coming up, it will be great to continue to work with all the operational staff to ensure a fantastic start in September 2025!









## Wrens

The last few weeks, Wrens have been learning about space, bugs, and Science Week! Wrens have been making bubble wrap bumblebees and cotton pad bugs. During Space Week, Wrens made rockets out of shapes, planet paintings with clingfilm, and puffy paint moons. Wrens enjoyed our parent showcase and doing all sorts of activities with their parents, which included gloop and paper mache planets.





## **Starlings**

Starlings have been having lots of fun with a week of Winnie the Pooh and his friends. We have been working on our personal, social and emotional skills by sharing toys, taking in turns with activities and encouraging children to join in each other's play. The children had a great week greeting each other every morning and creating new friendships. We have made a Winnie the Pooh for our board using yellow tissue paper sticking with glue, making honey pot sun-catcher with tissue paper, bumble bees with stripes, piglet with paint and lots more! Starlings have exploring materials such as honey play-dough, cheerio's and yellow/black pasta. Starlings are currently exploring the world of under the sea learning new sea creature words, listening to sea stories and watching real sea creatures on the iPad. With beautiful weather this week we also have had water play, sand play and shredded paper play.







## Wagtails

The wagtails have enjoyed doing lots of different activities to do with the Gruffalo story. They have been very creative making mice head bands and using fork to decorate a fox. The wagtails have enjoyed exploring the Gruffalo cave and seeing what creatures they can find. They have enjoyed making delicious melting moment biscuits which we had for afternoon snack. In the messy tray we have made owl rice creams, sensory ice play and finding spaghetti snakes in the messy tray. In the hall the children had great fun playing with the giant parachute and balls.

The children have been learning about the weather and singing lots weather songs. Wagtails have been adding and counting raindrops to umbrellas. The children have been making their own fruit kebabs. The children have been very creative this week and have been making their own musical instruments, decorating trees with blossoms and making ice lollies using different coloured pieces of paper. They have also been learning about sinking and floating and dressing up in different weather outfits.in the messy tray they have been washing different animals and exploring rainbow spaghetti play.



### **Lower Robins**

Lower Robins have been really busy these past few weeks with lots of fun activities. We have been exploring minibeasts and where we find them, children have been looking under rocks and logs, they found many bugs such as worms and woodlice! The children have also been looking at numbers on spiders and clipping their 'legs' onto their bodies. Lower robins have also been learning about St. Patricks Day and celebrating it by painting shamrocks, exploring green themed tuff trays and listening to Irish music. To celebrate Red Nose Day, Lower Robins have been venturing to the outdoor classroom and exploring different scents, they have also made some red cookies which they enjoyed at home and have been dressing up in red clothing and taking turns having their faces painted!











## **Upper Robins**

Last week, we focused on the theme of Families. The children engaged in some fantastic activities, such as creating houses for their families, designing family figures using shapes, and discussing who lives in their homes. They also enjoyed drawing pictures of their family members. It was heartwarming to witness how the children expressed their love and emotions for their families through these creative activities. This week, we're celebrating St. Patrick's Day, Red Nose Day, and starting to embrace the arrival of Spring as the weather begins to warm up! We've been busy with our sponsored bake for the Red Nose fundraiser, and the children have made some delicious treats to take home. We are also enjoying Spring Bingo, learning about Spring animals, and participating in outdoor classroom activities that involve exploring different scents with our Red Noses. Additionally, the children had a wonderful time planting seeds in the tuff tray and searching for coins in our St. Patrick's Day tuff tray.

## Skylarks Orange

We have thoroughly enjoyed our time at Skylarks! The children had a wonderful experience dressing up in their red outfits for Red Nose Day, showcasing an array of red princesses and some rather amusing costumes. They also had a fantastic time taking part in the sponsored cycle ride around our playground, where everyone had the chance to ride a bike. Additionally, they have been planting their very own beans, which we will watch develop and grow, allowing them to take them home for their families to plant.







## Skylarks Green

We concluded our focus on 'Space' with some 3D papier-mâché planets, created to contrast with our 2D marble painted planets and to highlight the differences between 'solid' and 'flat' shapes. During the following week, literacy activities dominated, culminating in a fabulous 'World Book Day', with every child dressing up as their favourite fictional character and with some parent volunteers reading favourite books to the Skylarks' children. Other activities designed to reinforce the children's understanding of the structure of stories included sequencing cards, re-telling the Cinderella story at the 'small world' table, exploring the 'Three Pigs' tray and recognising words that rhyme.

We extended this topic by then concentrating on the 'Jack and the Beanstalk' tale. Not only did we focus on the book, but we also sequenced numbered leaves up our beanstalk and planted a broad bean seed each, which we will observe over time. This week leads us into the theme of 'Down on the Farm'. The children have delighted in harvesting vegetables from the soil tray and playing alongside each other with the farm animals. They have also highlighted their knowledge of farm animals, their young, their homes and their produce via a card matching game and continued to tend to their now sprouting beans!

Congratulations to Clara, Harper, George and William, our competition winners - but bravo to all of Year 5, who took on the challenge with such passion!







## The Children's Book Project

We are again running the collection of new and nearly new (but in very good condition) books for the Children's Charity in the run up to the summer holidays.

Across London and the UK 1 in 4 disadvantaged children owns fewer than 10 books, whilst 1 in 8 has none at all. This has an impact not only on these children's academic outcomes but also on their wellbeing, emotional development and sense of themselves as a reader.

The Children's Book Project directly tackles this 'book gap' and gifts donated books to targeted communities across the Capital. These schools and community groups put on celebratory book gifting events at which children are invited to choose a book to take it home and keep. The charity expects to gift upwards of 70,000 books this year.


