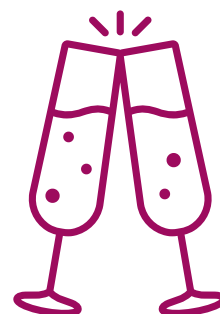

NURSERY & EARLY YEARS

Fledglings 1

The children have been enjoying exciting activities centred around The Hungry Caterpillar story. They have welcomed caterpillars into their room and are observing their growth. The children have had fun creating handprint caterpillars with their own faces, as well as planting various plants and seeds in the garden. They have also relished making fruit kebabs and using balloons to make caterpillar prints on paper.

Additionally, they have been engaging in counting activities and crafting their own caterpillars. The children have been listening to The Hungry Caterpillar story in a cosy corner and playing with real apples in a water tray. They have also enjoyed playing with farm animals in a messy tray. Furthermore, they have been busy creating handprint cows, solving pig puzzles, and exploring different sizes of caterpillars. In the sunny weather, the children have been spending time in the garden, having fun playing with water and transporting it to various containers.



NURSERY & EARLY YEARS

Fledglings 2

Sssssshh! Fledglings 2 have been on the hunt for creepy crawly minibeasts! Using their magnifying glasses, the children have been looking in soil, hay, sand, rice and all sorts of other textures. They have making bug hotels using different constructions, such as Duplo bricks, wooden bricks and stickle bricks, symmetrical butterflies using different colour paint, sticking cars with glue to make beetles and ants as well as making zig zag caterpillars.

Lots of counting has been accomplished, using ladybird spots, minibeast legs, grouping snails, looking at big and small snails and using tweezers to pick up pom poms for the queen bee beehive. Fledglings 2 have also enjoyed making their own minibeasts using playdough, making marmite whirls and pretending to be minibeasts through yoga!



NURSERY & EARLY YEARS

Lower Robins

Lower Robins has had a fantastic couple of weeks! They have been learning about life cycles. The children were introduced to new caterpillar friends and have been enjoying observing them over the week, watching them grow. Some of the Robins have also had fun making hungry caterpillar themed necklaces, practising their threading skills to complete them.

Additionally, they have enjoyed planting sunflowers and exploring what flowers need to grow. We have now moved on to learning about space. The children have been exploring the different planets, using balloons for painting and starting to create planets for the room using papier-mâché. The children had a great time getting messy and covering the balloons with sticky newspaper!



NURSERY & EARLY YEARS

Upper Robins

Over the last couple of weeks in Upper Robins, the children have been learning about different animals; the children have especially loved bringing photos in of their family/friends' pets or their favourite soft animal and talking about them. We have also had a special visit from Mr Garlick's puppy, Louis, and the children learned about what he likes to eat, why he sniffs, and they even had an opportunity to have a stroke of his soft fur!

Other exciting activities that the children have participated in have included milking a cow and learning where milk comes from, shearing a sheep with shaving foam, animal puzzles and an animal memory game. They have loved experiencing and exploring different animals and they have also been feeding a squirrel using lentils, exploring our small world safari and our crocodile swamp with gloop!



NURSERY & EARLY YEARS

Skylarks - Green

We completed our 'Eco Week' theme with some recycling activities and a focus on endangered animals and thinking about how we could salvage their dwindling numbers. We created shakers out of used plastic bottles and then went on a 'litter hunt' to ensure that our immediate environment was clean and tidy.

We extended the topic to incorporate the jungle and all of the animals that live there. The children delighted in building up narratives at the 'small world' jungle provision and whilst going on safari in the jungle role play area. They highlighted their developing fine motor skills, creativity and ability to continue an alternating pattern by threading pasta snakes, creating lion manes, making colourful African necklaces, collaging their own patterned animals, exploring the sensory tiger tray and cutting individual spiral snakes.

We are capitalising on the children's interest in the jungle theme this week too as we look at the story of 'Handa's Surprise'. This book will be used to reflect the diversity of the world and its people, introduce new vocabulary, highlight how quantities change when an item is taken away and provide an opportunity to sample some exotic fruits!



NURSERY & EARLY YEARS

Skylarks - Orange

Skylarks have been enjoying activities in the class and around the nursery over last two weeks as our topic has been all about minibeasts! We have been taking out our magnifying glasses and homemade binoculars and looking around the gardens for minibeasts. They made their own minibeasts from cutting out different templates of minibeasts and colouring them in. The children then went on to look at the first letter of the minibeast and sound out the words, for example L for Ladybird, S for Snail.

The second week we continued animal activities, but with a jungle feel; we made jungle jewellery with different coloured pasta, forming a variety of different patterns on the necklaces and brackets. They really enjoyed cutting out spiral snakes and listening quietly to the story of "Dear Zoo".



OAK

Jack and the Beanstalk

For our current topic, "Where does a story take you?" we've been focussing on the classic tale of Jack and the Beanstalk. The children were intrigued by the story's magical elements and loved exploring the various versions we discussed in class. It was interesting to see how different interpretations can add new perspectives to a familiar tale, particularly the perspective of the giant! The children had the opportunity to unleash their creativity by drawing and painting pictures of giants from their own imagination. The results were impressive, with each child adding unique details to their giant's appearance. Some giants were friendly and colourful, while others were fierce and fearsome.

Bear Planting and Observation

As part of our exploration of the story, the children planted their own beans in class. They've been taking care of their plants by watering them and making observations about their growth. We introduced "bean diaries" where the children documented their observations through drawings and sentences. It's been wonderful to see their excitement as their beans begin to sprout and grow!



OAK

Maths

Continuing with the "Jack and the Beanstalk" theme, we used cubes to measure the height of various objects in our classroom, including our own versions of beanstalks. We also had a lot of fun measuring each other's heights and comparing who was taller or shorter. In addition to measurement, we reviewed basic addition and subtraction concepts. The children practised these skills through various games and activities.

Forest School

Oak MCC had a brilliant time at Forest School last week! It was particularly wonderful to see how much their confidence has grown as they tried different activities and challenged themselves down in the woods. The highlight (apart from enjoying toasted marshmallows) was learning how to make fire, using fire strikers and cotton wool.

YEAR 2

Chicks

Year 2 have been extremely excited to watch our little eggs hatch and grow into 7 baby chicks; 3 girls and 4 boys. Over the weeks that we have had the pleasure of looking after them, we have been able to make observations, record changes and create artwork inspired by our new fluffy friends. The children in Chestnut also have been able to handle the chicks and we were really impressed with how sensibly and carefully the children were able to do this.



Outdoor Learning

Year 2 enjoyed their first session of Outdoor Learning! Using their learning about Andy Goldsworthy, they created their own artwork using natural materials in small groups. The children particularly loved the artwork Goldsworthy produced by lying down when it rains against different surfaces.



YEAR 3

AI

Mrs Nash's English group have been using Canva to generate AI images in order to bring their creations to life. They have worked on their descriptions to make sure the images can be as close to what they are picturing as possible. These images are of a rainbow tie-dye, star-shaped flower called a StarSwift, which can only be found in the wilds of Foglympianjwecclandia (Fogly for short), alongside beautiful glistening waters with golden fish. We can't forget our Fog Frog butler of course: anything you want, they'll provide!



Maths

Taking advantage of the beautiful sunshine, Mrs Nash's maths group took to solving word problems in the Outdoor Box on Wednesday. It's amazing how many questions you get done when there's the treat of a slide after each correct answer!



YEAR 3

Science

In Science, Year 3 have been looking at parts of plants. Tulips, it turns out, are excellent for spotting each part clearly. Thanks to Jan for the beautiful display that have made our Science lesson so much easier to carry out.



YEAR 4

Hindleap Trip

The children and teachers all had a fantastic time at Hindleap Warren last week! After making their beds and learning a duvet needs to go inside the cover, not just lay on top, the children developed their communication skills in a host of fun team building activities, which really tested their trust and patience with each other! They put their knowledge of water filtration to good use in their survival session, seeing who could produce the cleanest water if stranded on a desert island, and some even enjoyed the nettle tea we warmed over a fire. They demonstrated perseverance in the seesaw activity, and there were some budding archers hitting the bullseye in the archery session.

The muddy forest adventure proved a hit and students (and teachers!) were covered from head to toe in mud by the end! Memories of telling jokes around the campfire whilst toasting marshmallows, and marching through a wood with hands as antlers to scare away the drop bears, will hopefully stay with the children for a long time!

YEAR 5

Summer Term Giving Project - Sunflower pots

Year 5 have continued to focus on their Giving Project in form time over the past four weeks, designing and painting beautiful sunflower pots. The pots have been filled with a plant grown by the pupils themselves and will be looked after at home for a few weeks. The pupils are then going to be thinking carefully about who they would like to give their sunflower to - spreading kindness and joy.



English

Rohan T was inspired to write a description of a tiger. Enjoy his observations!

What is the Talent Show?

The Talent show is open to all pupils from Years 3–8. The emphasis is on comedy, singing, musical theatre and dance. For singing, you can audition a solo, a duet, and a trio would be lovely, especially if sung in harmony, and live piano or guitar accompaniment can work well. For comedy, it is best to opt for sketches written by comedians rather than pupils themselves. Magic, roller skating, bands, stand-up comedy, and puppets have all been in previous shows. Please rehearse, organise scripts, buy backing tracks, and learn your words, so that you are ready for auditions in weeks 2, 3 & 4 of the summer term.

The Talent Show is in Week 6 of the summer term.

Auditions will take place in weeks 2, 3 & 4. Please practice your acts so you are at performance standard for the audition, because out of 50 auditions only 20 acts can go through. To succeed, choreography needs to be complex and well executed (take ideas from YouTube) singers need to be in pitch/time with their backing track, so buy the music (karaoke version at £1.99 are good) and practice with it to ensure you audition with confidence. Bring your backing track to audition on an iPod, iPad or phone. We cannot use Spotify or YouTube, we have to 'own' the music to play it through the music tech sound desk. Comedy should be well rehearsed and amusing. Please ask your parents to help. They can assist with rehearsals. You do not need costumes for auditions. A special thanks to all our staff, especially members of the Health & Safety Committees, at both sites who work so hard to ensure the School is safe for our children, staff and visitors.

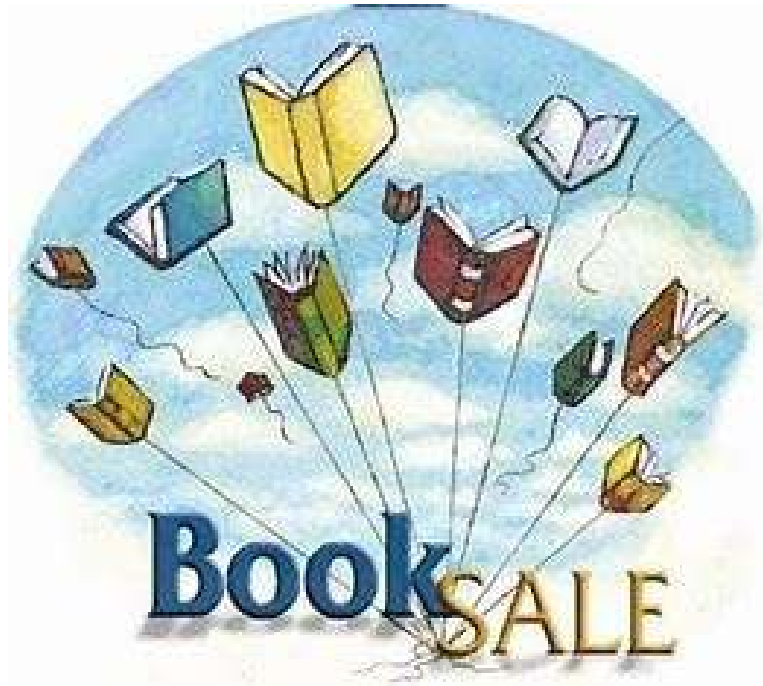




