

WHAT DO YOU LOVE MOST ABOUT YOUR JOB?

I love unlocking children's love of language. Last week's question 'How do you spell palaver?' gave me such joy! (Thanks, Charlotte B!) Olly B's *fear-infused eyes* was so beautifully expressed. I love it when sharing a text kick-starts heartfelt discussions about love, death, adventure, travel, driving or even the history of denim. When children rush to tell me about a book they've discovered, I love sharing that connection with them. And when they pour out creative and atmospheric ideas in ways I couldn't even dream of (that's you, Molly and Margot) my little cup of joy just overflows!

WHAT MOTIVATES YOU?

I confess that I became a teacher because of Julie Andrews! Mary Poppins and Maria Von Trapp both gave the children in their care useful lessons for life, a sense of structure and quite a few songs along the way. A spoonful of sugar really does help the medicine go down, and I try to find the sweetness in English activities so that everyone can have a go for themselves and feel proud of what they have achieved. I try to channel Maria's kindness, but I cannot claim to be practically perfect in every way. Mistakes make us human.

HOW DO YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO CHILDREN'S LIVES?

It really matters to me that our pupils leave us with justified confidence in their English skills. They know how to structure writing tasks, use punctuation effectively and express their ideas in entertaining ways. There's such satisfaction in knowing that they can tackle whatever comes their way because of my lessons. And leavers frequently write back and tell me this! Recently, watching 40 fascinated faces at the Miller Theatre's production of The Secret Garden was so inspiring. Hopefully they will go on to explore more theatre - and classic literature - for themselves.

WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FORWARD TO THIS YEAR?

I've signed up for the Reigate 10k in September (encouraged by Miss Dancy) so I'll need to dig out my running shoes. I have Wimbledon tickets - my favourite sporting event. Later this term, Year 8 will be reading The Diary of Anne Frank in playscript form. Every time I explore the experiences of her short life with our pupils, I am reminded of her perseverance and incredible sense of hope for humanity. A visit to the annex in Amsterdam is on my bucket list... maybe 2026.









Wrens

The last two weeks, the wrens have been doing Smiley Shark (for Healthy Smiles Week) and pets. Last week, we explored a messy tray of toothpaste with toothbrushes, sharks trapped in ice, and we made shark hats and walked the plank! This week, we have made pet suncatchers, collage pet pictures, tried to catch the fish in the water with nets, and cleaned the muddy animals.



Starlings

Starlings have been having fun exploring the jungle world! We have been learning animals sounds using our voices and using musical instruments to imitate too! We have been exploring fun tuff trays using different materials such as tissue paper, pasta tubes, oats, gloop and jelly with chia seeds for our crocodile swamp. The children enjoyed free playing with elephant playdough, using different drawing tools for jungle pictures, building with mega blocks and lots more. Parrots, monkeys, tigers and lions have been made using paint and feathers. Starlings are currently spending their week looking at building friendships via exploring tuff tray, free playing together and making fun pictures!





The children have been exploring the topic of shapes. We discussed how shapes can be found in everyday objects. Additionally, we introduced our new sound of the week: 'i'. The children enjoyed looking at pictures of items that begin with this sound.

Last week, we celebrated Healthy Smiles Week. The children participated in a tooth brushing challenge, which prompted discussions about the importance of brushing our teeth and eating healthy foods.

We celebrated Valentine's Day by engaging in craft activities, including cutting out hearts. The children also created Valentine's cards for their families.











Upper Robins

Last week we focused on Healthy Smiles, the children had a fantastic time learning how to keep their teeth clean and happy! We incorporated various activities where they practised self-care routines and mastered putting on their shoes and socks. Additionally, we explored healthy eating and discussed the different emotions we encountered in our daily life.

This week in celebration of Valentine's Day, we are excited to combine this theme with red and pink colours. The children had the chance to explore emotions through stories and sensory play activities in the tuff tray and showed their mark making skills and pencil control with Valentine's Day pencil control sheets. We also made Valentine's Day cards and talked about the ways we show love to others, as well as why we exchange cards on this special day.

Skylarks Orange

The Skylarks have had another wonderful couple of weeks! On Monday, we were delighted to welcome a dentist who gave an informative talk on "How to Care for Our Teeth." The children learned various ways to maintain clean and healthy teeth. She recommended brushing twice a day for two minutes using either an age-appropriate manual toothbrush or an electric toothbrush that can time the two minutes for them. The dentist also advised the children to limit sugary snacks to occasional treats and to visit their dentist for check-ups twice a year.

Additionally, the Skylarks enjoyed making their Valentine's cards for their families. We explored books about love and friendship, which inspired the children to create a variety of designs for their cards. They also practised writing their names inside the cards. Great work, Skylarks!

We completed our focus on Chinese New Year with some group dragon dancing on the grass area, noodle sampling using chopsticks and Chinese lantern making, all these activities reinforced the children's understanding of the world in a visual, hands-on way. The following week we concentrated on our self-care, particularly keeping our teeth clean and healthy, as we fully embraced 'Healthy Smiles Week'. We practised our brushing techniques, role played in our dental surgery, made a giant toothbrush, and had a talk from a local dental nurse teaching us all about caring for our teeth and healthy eating. In support of NSPCC 'Number Day', there were plenty of counting and number and shape recognition activities, number rhymes and number games on offer, all designed to consolidate the children's numeracy skills in a fun, relaxed way.

This week love is well and truly in the air as we look ahead to St. Valentine's Day. Not only have we spoken about who we love (and why), explored the textured heart tray and shared stories about love and kindness, we have also learnt the importance of our own wellbeing, even having time to relax in our own little Skylarks' Spa!

Number Day


The children enthusiastically demonstrated their maths knowledge during our NSPCC Number Day.

They arrived dressed in outfits featuring patterns, shapes, or numbers and engaged in a variety of mathematical activities. These activities included decorating biscuits to illustrate the concept of part, part whole; programming a Beebot to rescue aliens; creating a foot measure and using it to measure different objects around the classroom; exploring symmetry through paint and paper folding; making toast tangrams to form various shapes; and enjoying addition games together.

We concluded the day in The Box, where the children had a wonderful time showcasing their mathematical learning on the Lego wall and drawing on the whiteboard tables and walls.















Science

In Science, we have been putting our sense of smell to the test! We had fun smelling the various aromas and some funny faces were made while sniffing pickled onions, but we were quite impressed with how accurately we could identify different scents without seeing the items. Thankfully, there were some more pleasant smells to enjoy too!





Art

This week, 1S had a great time creating and showcasing their Flat Stanley models, alongside their Aboriginal-style paintings of Australian animals. They enjoyed the painting technique so much that we decided to use it to make Valentine's Day cards, and the results were simply beautiful!



Maths

Our Maths explorations in "The Box" was a big hit this week. We extended our addition and subtraction skills, delved into place value using the Lego wall and whiteboard wall, and solved tangram puzzles — even creating a pyramid with the pieces. We also played a fun game where we "splatted" meerkats in the desert while counting in twos. The language of maths was flowing all around, and the students continued to talk about their explorations well into the day!
