CORONATION CELEBRATIONS

After the excitement of last year's Platinum Jubilee, followed by our fond farewell to Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, it is time to celebrate a new era through the coronation of King Charles III. And who doesn't love bunting! How to celebrate? Hazelwood certainly gave it a good go.

The dining room was transformed into a vision of red, white and blue, with flags, banners, streamers, kitchen staff in coronation T-shirts and masks, and of course, our very own Charles and Camilla in cardboard form, to watch us tucking into good old fish'n'chips, plus coronation cupcakes. No broad beans, but it was certainly delicious!

Chestnut pupils visited our local Abbeyfield care home, reaching out to residents and sharing their home-made crown biscuits as well as memories of the coronation of 1953. They also held a service of celebration at St Peter's Church, Limpsfield, and planted a crab apple tree, 'Royal Beauty', in our school grounds as a lasting symbol of this era.

On Friday afternoon, the whole school gathered in the Bawtree Hall for a celebration of assembly, led by our parade of pupils named Charles, Charlie and Charlotte. Miss Charlotte Dancy pulled one name out of hat to be crowned: Charlie Moore in 8L! To cheers from his year group, he was crowned by the Archbishop (Mr Burnett) and took his throne in royal robes, accompanied by Harry Rodford's drum rolls and James Castell's own trumpet fanfare compositions. Pupils with a link to countries in the Commonwealth were then invited to place their flags around our school monarch's throne. To the great surprise of the entire school, we were then reminded of the King's love of Scotland, as Hamish Land processed into the hall playing his bagpipes, and dressed in his kilt. He was brilliant! (I must write and tell the King!) Mr Lloyd shared some of the Welsh language with us, as part of our understanding of the United Kingdom.

We were delighted that Chestnut pupils sang their coronation song for us, 'Sing for the King', word perfect, and led by Mrs Haydock. Finally, we reflected on the late Queen's love of Corgis, our new King and Queen's devotion to their rescue Jack Russells, Bluebell and Beth, and met a canine royal devotee, Sidney the Cocker Spaniel (to the oohs and aahs of the crowd). Unfortunately, he was under the illusion that the toy Corgi was in fact a cat, and could not be persuaded to perform any of his customary tricks.

We then gathered together on the Head's Lawn for a whole school photo, coronation flags held aloft, before the excitement of Royal Relay Races. The sight of pupils galloping up the field on their polo ponies (swimming woggles) controlling shinty sticks with tennis balls was not to be missed! A carousel of royal challenges led by our Heads of Houses involved water balloons, playing cards, stealing the crown jewels and sketching images of a king. Dark clouds stayed away, and it was joyous to spend time together in houses with a highly memorable afternoon.

Volunteering was at the heart of the extra Bank Holiday Monday, and our pupils were challenged to litter pick in their local community, wash a car for someone else, or bake for a neighbour. Many pupils took this on with such enthusiasm; please do send us pictures of any volunteering efforts, and keep it up. Science proves that acts of kindness for others seriously improve your health. If you have borrowed a litter picker, **please return it to the school office to be used in later initiatives.**

Fledglings 1

Last week, Fledglings celebrated the King's Coronation, engaging in lots of arts and crafts including making King Charles suncatchers, now displayed on our garden doors as well as bunting, wreath, a Jewel hunt and crown decorating. On Friday we joined the nursery wide party where the children enjoyed dancing and playing party games as well as decorating biscuits and cakes. The children also made their own cucumber sandwiches during the week which they enjoyed for their morning snack. We had lots of messy trays which was related to the coronation such as a guard and the national flag.

We have also been exploring the deep dark wood. We have seen a fox, owl, snake, mouse and the big Gruffalo which the children have nicknamed him "Gruff" on our adventures. The children have enjoyed listening to the story as well as watching the puppet show where they pretended to hide when Gruff was on stage. In the messy play the children played with different coloured snakes (spaghetti) and used tools such as tweezers to learn how to use a pincer grip. Laura and Becka have been making a Gruffalo with the children where they had to place different facial features on their Gruffalo's face as well as identifying where their face is. The children who will be going to Robins in September have been doing a Big and Small activity with Beth where they were able to identify the Big and Small Gruffalo as well as pretending to be him. Arsha has been making some handprint Gruffalos too which the children put the facial features on independently once dry.

Fledglings 2

Over the last two weeks Fledglings 2 have enjoyed learning about mini beasts. The children have been busy counting spots on a ladybird and making their own bumblebees and spiders. They have loved visiting the pond and exploring all the different wildlife too. They have also enjoyed using tweezers to pick up different minibeasts in the messy tray covered in a huge spider web and have been exploring lots of different habitats where the mini beasts live! Furthermore, the children have made symmetrical butterflies using different coloured paints, exploring natural materials with the magnifying glasses and making their own stick insects too. Fledglings 2 were invited to an amazing picnic lunch with the rest of the nursery and have taken part in many coronation activities. They all beautifully dressed up in red, white and blue and decorated their own biscuit using icing and sprinkles!

Lower Robins

The Lower Robins children have had lots of fun celebrating the King's Coronation. We have been creating some beautiful crowns using corks to print paint. The children have also been practising cutting using children's scissors to make some bunting to decorate our room. In our key groups, we have each collaged our own King Charles using a variety of coloured materials. We also iced some yummy biscuits for the celebration. The Robins children loved dressing up in red, white and blue to attend our special coronation picnic lunch.

This week we have been looking at The Snail and the Whale book. The children have loved exploring our sea animals small world display. We have been talking about the different sea creatures that live in the sea and have enjoyed reading the book at circle time. The children loved going for a snail hunt around the nursery gardens and were able to count how many we could see.

Upper Robins

Last week in Upper Robins we have been preparing for the King's coronation with lots of fun activities and crafts, with a build up to the end of the week where we had a whole nursery picnic and party games. The children particularly loved making a large-scale Union Jack using their handprints and red/white/blue paint, even the teachers have added their handprints to this creation. They have also enjoyed making red/white/blue bunting to hang up in class, making crowns to wear at their picnic, having an afternoon tea with the teddies and making shapes with red/white/blue play dough.

This week the children have been learning about under the sea. They have particularly loved learning about which objects float and sink by placing different objects in the water and then guessing if they would float or not. We have also been sea writing in the blue coloured salt, using paintbrushes, playing with sea animals in the water, using our cutting skills to make jellyfish and making under the sea pictures using different materials. The children have also enjoyed practicing their songs in music for their summer concert and practicing our running skills for sports day.



NURSERY & EARLY YEARS

Skylarks - Green

The children in Skylarks Green incorporated the Coronation of our new King into their topic on 'Kings and Queens' last week. We had majestic role play on the thrones set up in our role play castle, and made beautiful crowns, necklaces, flags and shields to enhance this pretend play. We made castles from a selection of 2D shapes and matched amounts to numbered crowns. The children learned about the Royal family members and listened as we spoke about how British Values underpin what we do in nursery. We had a fantastic whole school picnic and enjoyed icing our crown biscuits, very kindly provided by the kitchen.

This week we have focused upon Superheroes, the highlight of the week being Wednesday's 'dress up' day. We reinforced our language, physical development, numeracy and literacy skills across a variety of stimulating activities including rescuing superheroes from the giant web, negotiating a Ninja obstacle course, measuring Superheroes using maths units, describing the superpower we would like to possess and designing a cape. 'Supertato' and his 'Superveggy' friends visited too, bringing an extra dimension to the children's 'small world' provision.

Skylarks - Orange

Last week Skylarks were in celebration mode as we celebrated the King's coronation. The children enjoyed playing in their castle role play area with knights' costumes, crowns and a royal throne for the King. The children all made various pictures of the union jack and worked together to create wonderful pieces of art. The children made their own crowns which they wore when we ended the week with a fantastic picnic on the grass with the rest of the nursery.

Calling all super heroes! This week the children had a fantastic time dressing up as their favourite super heroes, they even brought along their own companions.... supertatos! We had a great time at music with our themed lesson and everyone enjoyed our Superhero assault course in the garden. The children have been making their own capes and swatted different super sounds and super CVC words!

Reception Class

Oak has been looking at Jack and the Beanstalk for this part of our topic. The children have enjoyed ordering and roleplaying the story using costumes and small-world toys. They have drawn and painted giants, planted a bean, created a castle stake to hold up their bean and written recounts for part of the story. The children have enjoyed using maths to measure beanstalks, comparing and measure their shoes, and they have even measured parts of their body!

For the coronation, the children enjoyed making crowns, decorating biscuits, and we had a fantastic picnic on the lawn.


YEAR 2



YEAR 4


Maths


WOW!

George N in Year 7 has designed a 3D noughts and crosses game, using only a shoebox and some wires. This is how he did it.

Operating the Game

Press the button above the power inlet to turn the device on. The 'Change/Start' button will flash on and off. Press this button to start the game.

The device will then choose a random player to start the game. It will flash each player's buttons in turn, slowing down and stopping on the player to start.

Playing the Game

The players have two buttons: one labelled 'Change' or 'Change/Start', and the other labelled 'Select'. If a player's button is illuminated, then it is that player's turn.

Pressing the 'Change' button will move the green cursor one space onward, looping to the start when it reaches the end. Pressing the 'Select' button will place the player's colour at that spot, if it is not already occupied. If it is, though, then the cube will flash red for one second.



Game Rules

Horizontal and vertical 3-in-a-rows can be scored at any location on the cube. Diagonals have to start at one corner and finish at the exact opposite corner. On winning, the winner's buttons will be illuminated and the loser's will not. The cube will turn the colour of the winner's counters.


The results are in and the winning author is.....

EXCITING SUMMER CONCERT FEATURES HAYDN'S NELSON MASS

Hurst Green Singers' Summer Concert on 13th May is fast approaching and the choir is busy rehearsing to ensure it gives an exceptionally polished performance for this special occasion. The local choir will be accompanied by an orchestra and the solo voice parts in the work will be performed by highly accomplished singers from the Royal Academy of Music: Emilia Bertolini (Soprano); Hera Protopapas (Mezzo-Soprano); Guy Benon (Tenor) and Alex Bower-Brown (Baritone).

The Summer Concert will take place in the Bawtree Hall, Hazelwood School, Oxted on Saturday 13th May at 7.00pm. It promises to be a wonderful evening of memorable music – so book your tickets without delay.




The Oxted Patient Action Group (OPAG) is your local charity established in 2018 to help raise much needed funds for equipment to benefit patients at Oxted Health Centre.
