The children have had lots of fun exploring our dinosaur world, making yummy dinosaur chocolate Krispies and completing a tricky obstacle course. They have had lots of activities on the go from free drawing of their own dinosaurs, threading, matching dinosaur eggs and counting spikes. Our tuff tray has had lots of dinosaurs in different materials such as coffee granules, sand, cereals and lovely sticky mud. Different dinosaurs were made using stickle bricks, mega blocks and Duplo blocks even building them different homes!









#### **Lower Robins**

Lower Robins had a new addition to the staff team on the return from the Christmas break with Nicola joining the team. She has been busy getting to know the children and learning all their individual personalities and interests! The Robins have been focusing on people who help us and activities included doctor themed role play, counting emergency vehicles, creating xrays using handprints and collaging to create fire!

This week, with the cold temperatures, Robins have been looking at weather! Brrr! The children have enjoying exploring ice, dressing up in the newly modelled home corner and exploring the messy play table involving snowy animals.













### **Upper Robins**

Over the last two weeks in Upper Robins, the children have really enjoyed our topic of jungle animals, they have loved pretending to be different animals by dressing up and using a variety of animal masks. We have also been making our group animals using their handprints, even the teachers have made their own! We made leopards, monkeys, tigers, and zebras. Also, the children have enjoyed making Pom Pom snakes and practicing their cutting skills to cut them out, matching the animals with their patterns, counting different animals, and moving like animals using a die to select the different animals.

There has also been a variety of different messy play activities in the tuff tray for them to explore such as zebra shaving foam, crocodile swamp gloop and jungle spaghetti with a lot more to explore for the rest of this week.

Another highlight that the children have enjoyed exploring our jungle small world table and our train safari that have had lots of different animals to explore.











#### **Skylarks - Green**

Last week the children completed their focus on Winter. They enjoyed playing imaginatively in the 'Frozen'- inspired role play area and with the arctic 'small world' provision. We learned about how ice changes its state as it thaws and fashioned snowmen out of marshmallows. Some children sequenced the letters of their name in the format of a snowman whilst others worked collectively to create a large polar bear and snowman to adorn our board. Individual penguins and numbered hot chocolate cups (with the corresponding amount of mini marshmallows) finished off our topic board perfectly.

This week the fascinating theme of Space has captured the children's imagination. They have listened attentively to facts about the planets in our Solar System, how rockets are launched and how astronauts train. The topic has been vividly brought to life with the children engaged in many sensory and visual activities including making papier mache planets, exploring textured 'Moon Sand' and making 3D shaped rockets alongside opportunities to fully extend their pretend play and imaginative language through role play in the 'Space Station' and with the 'small world' rocket. 'To infinity and beyond...!'.







### **Skylarks - Orange**

Happy New Year from all of us at Skylarks! We hope you had a wonderful holiday season is and we're thrilled to have the children back. They've returned refreshed and excited to dive back into the fun we have together at Skylarks. Last week, we've taken a gentler approach and focused on some fantastic winter activities. We've been exploring the arctic and Atlantic animals, discovering where they live and how they live. The children have been so creative, using all sorts of chalk, paints, and crayons to create beautiful wintry scenes. We've also been impressed by their cutting skills as they've made intricate snowflake patterns is. And they had a blast using hammers to break the ice and find hidden treasures. Handwriting practice has been a big hit too, with the children tracing and then writing their names. During our group times, we've been sharing stories about our Christmas experiences and the special moments we spent with our families.

# OAK

The children in Oak have been enjoying their new topic on space: "What is out there?". For our Pastoral day, the children created space-themed backgrounds and cut-out stars which they decorated. They also enjoyed mindfulness colouring, and we made class mind maps about everything they already knew about space. The children especially enjoyed having their faces painted. As part of our space topic, we created split-pin astronauts and used concertinas to make bouncy legs and arms for our own astronaut pictures.

In maths, the children have been enjoying exploring weight and capacity. They have been weighing items to find balance, as well as filling containers with various materials to compare amounts. We have been exploring teen numbers and bundling tens to better understand how to construct teen numbers.

This week, the children have been enjoying the story "Whatever Next" by Jill Murphy. We had a discussion about the bear's cardboard box rocket and the items he brought to the moon. To bring the story to life, the children created their own rockets using large boxes. They also made boosters, a command board, and fire using different materials, while explaining the function of each part. After building their rockets, we acted out the story through role-play, accompanied by Elton John's 'Rocket Man' playing in the background. The children used their imaginations and impressive vocabulary throughout the afternoon, using the objects they had collected and made to imagine themselves in space. It was a truly enchanting and memorable afternoon! The children then wrote lists of what they would want to take to space with them. There were some great items on their lists including a snake, snacks, a soft pillow, a pair of pliers, a soda stream and even a defibrillator!








#### **Flat Stanley Topic**










#### Science

The children created their own Roman theatre masks in a variety of characters.










### Science


### **Other News**






