HAZELWOOD COMMUNITY FUND



Recently we emailed parents about re-invigorating the Hazelwood Community Fund.

We are thrilled that Hazelwood has recently been able to grant Edenbridge Primary School with a £750 grant!

Edenbridge Primary School has a staggering 37% of their children on free school meals and a number of children regularly not having breakfast or dinner at home. This grant will go towards Edenbridge Primary School's hardship fund. If a parent approaches the school in need of urgent financial assistance as they cannot afford to provide a necessary item for their children, the hardship fund can support them. Edenbridge Primary School does so much to help its parent base including a partnership with Sal's Shoes which has already this year provided 9 x pairs of shoes to families whose children's school shoes are broken or too small and they cannot afford to replace them. This grant is a welcome boost and will go towards making things a little bit easier for families in need.

At Hazelwood, we have always understood the importance of helping and supporting local charities and all the amazing work they do. Pre-Covid, our Community Fund had supported over 25 x charities in our local area. We would now like to give an extra injection of our support to this important fund scheme and in doing so, give even more Hazelwood parents the opportunity to help make a difference to local lives.














Fledglings 2

Fledglings 2 have enjoyed making their own plate of food using glue to stick pictures, making caterpillar paper chains, painting to make a huge caterpillar for our board as well as making their own mini story book using pictures from the hungry caterpillar story. The children have had so much fun exploring free flowing activities such as threading cheerio's on to pipe cleaners, feeding a hungry caterpillar, building caterpillars and butterflies out of duplo blocks and matching coloured Pom poms. Creative play has been hugely popular with free drawing of a fruit bowl, sticking tissue paper to make a cocoon and using paint to make symmetrical butterfly. As always Fledglings 2 love to make use of this gorgeous sunshine so they have been exploring in the garden with water play, the sandpit and sitting in a tent with books.













Lower Robins

In Lower Robins, we have been talking about sea creatures as part of our Snail and the Whale theme. The children have enjoyed creating their own jelly fish using paper plates, paints, glitter and tissue paper. We collected some pebbles from the garden and created some rock snails. The children have loved splashing in blue water in the garden using containers to pour, fill and empty.

We have been reading the Oliver's Vegetables story and have been taking about the importance of healthy eating. The children took part in a physical activity using tweezers to carefully pick up frozen vegetables and transfer them into their groups. We have also had fun painting using fruit and vegetables to print. In our Take Art session this week, the children explored the texture of play dough using their feet and enjoyed shaking a foil sensory sheet listening to the sounds it made.














Upper Robins

In Upper Robins we have continued our topic of pirates, the children have loved making telescopes to use on our pirate ship in the playground, we have also been making pirate hats to go alongside our telescopes. This week the children been practising their cutting and pencil control skills by using different cutting and pencil control sheets. Some of the children have even been forming recognisable letters of their name. There has been lots of time outside in the garden and on the playground enjoying the sunshine and the children have enjoyed practising running for our forthcoming sports day.











Skylarks - Green

This week we were learning about recycling. Children experienced a variety of opportunities and activities to explore and learn about recycling in a fun and practical way. We looked at activities and crafts such as sorting cards, shredded papers, display posters and colouring pages which helped children to enhance their learning of recycling. We have been junk modelling which is great for children's creativity, imagination, their fine and gross motor skills as well as communication.

We also learnt about the impact that plastic and pollution has on sea creatures and their homes. This will help children to develop an awareness of environmental issues and sharing their ideas of how they can help to solve the sea pollution underpinning their communication skills.

We are having 'Sorting Recycling' tuff tray activity. Children found items using pincers, sorting them out into their appropriate recycling bins which supports their fine and gross motor skills, attention, and problem-solving skills.











Skylarks - Orange

Skylarks had a 'bugtastic' week last week! The children have really enjoyed exploring minibeasts and their homes by making bug hotels and exploring their natural homes at forest school. The children counted the legs onto different numbered spiders, used symmetry to create butterflies and matched the numbers on the ladybirds on the whiteboard. We went on bug hunts in the garden and played turn taking games using bumblebees on our heads!

Recycling! The children have been exploring recycling this week and looking at the different ways we can help look after our planet such as reducing & reusing. Our role play area has been 'deconstructed' and replaced with cardboard boxes for the children to think of their own purposes, they have been used as caves, baby beds, houses and a dog bed. Our art table has also been taken over by boxes and other recyclables which were kindly brough in by the children, they have been 'reusing' these in the junk modelling creations.











OAK

Reception Class

Oak have enjoyed looking at Journeys through stories. They have been watching their beans grow, that they planted the week before. The children have enjoyed writing in their bean diaries to record the changes. We also looked at the different parts of a plant. The children designed and constructed houses using various materials and wrote sentences from the point of view of different characters in The Three Little Pigs.

We have been looking at number bonds to 5 and 10, using numicon towers to show number bonds to 10. The children have also been measuring using non-standard units. They measured different-sized beanstalks as well as different body parts.

Oak practised and performed their Celebration Showcase in front of their families. Each class sang and explained what they had learnt in the different topics we have looked at this year. They particularly enjoyed performing the encore of Chick Chick Chicken using sign language, with audience participation!

Mrs Keaton's class enjoyed a morning at Forest School where they had a go at den making, in preparation for den making day on Friday. They also enjoyed sausages in rolls and toasted marshmallows.




Money
















Push and Pull


Sandcastles


Children had fun in the sun this week building sandcastles in our outdoor sandpit, whilst learning to follow step-by-step instructions. The results were most impressive!














Cello Recital - 4H

Macbeth

7A have been learning about the context of Shakespeare's Macbeth, exploring the different ways in which Shakespeare was influenced by the social, cultural and political events of the time. Here are some articles summarising what they discovered.

Shakespeare's Malicious Macbeth! By: Henry BH

Introduction:

Do you know what Macbeth is? Everyone knows that it's a maelstrom of death, murder and betrayal. It's a world of ghosts, evil, supernatural and horror! Read on to discover why people loved this wicked play.

King James I - Scott's Son:

King James I is connected to the play since the King in Macbeth is made after him. James was the first monarch to rule over Scotland, Ireland and England, so the play was set in Scotland. James liked reading and had a great love for learning and wrote two books. One about smoking and the other about witchcraft called Daemonologie. He was very interested in witches and the supernatural so that's why Shakespeare put so many witches and spirits in Macbeth since the King loves it. Also, it could be used to flatter the King and say without him the world would end.

Gunpowder Plot - It'll blow your mind:

The Gunpowder Plot is connected to Macbeth. The Gunpowder Plot was made in 1605 by a group of Catholic conspirators who planned to assassinate the King. They smuggled in barrels of gunpowder under Parliament and enough powder was stored to blow up Parliament and everyone inside. Fortunately, Guy Fawkes was found 12 hours before and the group was hung, drawn and quartered. Macbeth is meant to show what happens if the King was killed. He embeds the treacherous plot into his own story.

Divine Right of Kings - Regal rules:

The Divine Right of Kings is connected to the play because it shows how the King is God's servant. Jacobeans believed that there was a holy order to the universe decided by God. Anything supernatural was against the order and therefore against God. Kings were God's agents on Earth and any act against a King was an act against God. It also said Satan was responsible for witches and the supernatural. A Jacobean audience would believe that the witches and Lady Macbeth were working with the devil. It was believed that chaos and mayhem would rule the Earth until the true heir was returned to the throne. Macbeth shows that if the King was killed the word would be cursed by God. Proving the Divine Right of Kings. Shakespeare + Macbeth - See the world in Shakespeare's time!

Macbeth was written to be performed on a stage so the setting, props and atmosphere would have a big impact on the audience's understanding of the play. Macbeth was performed in April 1611. Sea-captains, merchants and clerks would have sat in the galleries for 2-6 pence, rich and famous people would sit in the 'Gentleman's Room' for a shilling each and the poor would stand in the yard for a penny. Women weren't allowed to act so men played female parts. The original theatre burned down and the one now is an exact replica with thatched walls made from goat hairs. Musicians with drums, trumpets or other instruments made sound effects behind the stage. In the 1600s, the Globe was hugely popular bringing 20,000 Londoners in a week.

Conclusion:

In conclusion, Macbeth is very closely related to the social and historic events in the 1600s. Which would be fresh news for the audiences and they would be quite aware about the act of treason against the King back then. In 2023 however, it's rash to convince your husband to kill the monarch. I wouldn't recommend it guys!

MACBETH was a play written by William Shakespeare in the 1600. Children's Book Project

UKMT Mathematical Challenge

During Numeracy across the curriculum week, almost 100 pupils, mainly from Years 8-6 joined more than 250 000 students in taking the UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge. This is a 60-minute, multiple-choice competition to encourage 'mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The problems on the Junior Mathematical Challenge are designed to make students think. Most are accessible, yet still challenge those with more experience.'







