We are enthusiastic about the enriching experiences and opportunities these themes offer our school community. Your partnership and support in your child's educational journey are deeply appreciated and invaluable.



#### **Fledglings 1**

The children have had lots of fun learning about the monkey puzzle and discovering which animals live in the jungle. They have been playing with jungle animals in shaving foam and pasta play. The children have also had fun making their own monkey puzzle book and threading green paper to make vines. The children have been printing with leaves to make patterns on the paper. Fledglings 1 have been feeding the monkey with balls and collaging their own big monkey for the cozy corner. They have been making their own family collages and listening to the Monkey Puzzle book. The children had fun making their own symmetrical butterflies and singing different jungle animal songs.





















#### **Fledglings 2**

For two weeks, Fledglings 2 have taken a trip into the life of a farm. They have been pretending to be different types of farm animals by making animal sounds, creating their own masks, and even practising animal yoga! They have had lots of free-flowing fun activities from animals in playdough, free drawing of farm animals, playing musical instruments to sing farm songs, solving animal puzzles, and building their own barns and houses with Duplo blocks! Fledglings 2 have been practising their counting with pigs, mixing paint colours for printing, threading spaghetti with Cheerios, and using tweezers to hunt for worms in mud to build their fine motor skills.





#### **Lower Robins**

We have had a busy couple of weeks in Lower Robins, exploring two familiar stories; 'The Hungry Caterpillar' and 'Rainbow Fish.' The children have been learning about the life cycle of a caterpillar and looking at different colours and emotions. Robins have enjoyed taking part in a variety of activities, such as coloured ice painting, breaking big blocks of ice to find out what's inside, and making numbered caterpillars. They have used celery to paint fish scales, and glued and stuck to make beautiful rainbow fish.

Lower Robins have spent time enjoying the outside area, with all children thoroughly enjoying the sandpit and climbing frame. We have also been on an Autumn walk, collecting conkers and leaves to explore in the room.















#### **Upper Robins**

Over the last two weeks in Upper Robins, we have been looking at the topic Autumn. The children have loved exploring all things Autumn and really enjoyed their autumn walk, where they collected autumn objects, such as different coloured leaves, acorns, sticks, and even conkers. They enjoyed watching a squirrel gather its nuts and run up a tree, and they loved watching a big bumblebee collecting nectar from a large sunflower.

Robins have made autumn trees using fingerprints, explored the natural materials collected on the walk using magnifying glasses, threaded with leaves, and made autumn wreaths using the natural materials.

The children have shown great interest when talking about different seasons of the year and reading autumn stories. The children have enjoyed exploring the conkers and acorns. They have loved rolling them, sorting them, and counting them to see how many they had. The children have enjoyed making sun catchers with lots of colours, making hedgehogs out of playdough and penne pasta, counting leaves, and looking at their colours.















#### **Skylarks - Green**

Last week, Skylarks Green focused their attention on families, emotions, and looking at their individual similarities and differences. We fashioned different faces from playdough, painted different expressions on the foil, made individual mirrors, and gave our cardboard tube faces unique hairstyles made from paper clips. All these activities highlighted the children's creativity and developing fine motor skills.

To enhance our numeracy skills, we tried to link the correct numeral to the quantity of people in our families. The children also enjoyed their first session of Forest School. This week, the story of 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears' has provided the backdrop to our learning. We have explored simple volume in the porridge tray, re-enacted the story using role-play props and the 'small world' resources, and individually sequenced the illustrations to retell this traditional tale. We highlighted size differentiation by using the number cubes to measure the bowls of porridge, chairs, and beds and listened to the story in a variety of formats to really consolidate the children's comprehension.





#### **Skylarks - Orange**

Last week, we covered "All About Me" books and the children truly enjoyed sharing information about their friends and family. We also discussed our emotions and how they make us feel, which included colouring in emotional monsters. Additionally, we created facial expressions to reflect our current feelings, and all the children had happy faces. We proudly displayed our emotion pictures depicting the children engaged in various activities.

This week, we delved into the story of Goldilocks, emphasizing the Three Bears' behaviour code. We discussed the importance of kind hands, active listening, and ensuring safety, all while encouraging perseverance and not giving up. We also had a great time reenacting the Three Bears story in our garden. The children enthusiastically listened to the story and followed Goldilocks and the Three Bears as they explored our outdoor space.















### OAK

Oak has been enjoying learning about superheroes and discussing what makes people super. They particularly enjoyed sharing what made their parents super! We have been sharing various stories about Supertato, which included discussions of new vocabulary such as "villain" and "lair," as well as different heroes. During activities, the children created their own Supertato and Evil Pea characters and added the Evil Peas to their city landscape. The children even folded concertinas to make their Evil Pea stick out from their artwork.

We've been practising the Harriet letter starting shape, which will help us learn to write our pre-cursive letters. We had fun writing it in sand and foam, painting it, drawing it in chalk on the playground, and even painting it in the air with our pointy pencil fingers. The children have loved playing memory games and practising their fine motor skills by making Hama bead creations, dough disco and cutting out.

In Phonics, we have enjoyed learning about different sounds and competing with other classes to think of the most words for each new letter sound. Fred the frog only talks in sounds which we have to blend. We have loved playing Fred's games, such as Fred says, and Fred says Find, blending the sounds to do what he asks.

The children have been learning about subitizing up to 5 in maths. They've been exploring patterns with potato stamps and delving deeper into the numbers 1 to 5, reflecting on how they are formed and the various ways we can create them using different resources. We have also been practising writing our numerals to 5!

Mrs Keaton's class had Forest School this week, and they particularly enjoyed looking at the pond and doing some pond dipping. The rest of Oak can't wait for their session!









The children have enjoyed creating collages of the story "Somebody Swallowed Stanley" using torn paper. They have also explored model magic to create amazing sea creatures.













We have looked at what makes a good sentence: a capital letter, full stop and checking whether it makes sense. The children were challenged to put words in the correct order to create a human sentence. We used actions to show a capital letter and a full stop.



The word of the week in 1T was innovative. The children were challenged to create a machine or vehicle to recycle or pick up rubbish. There were some amazing ideas and detailed explanations. Inventors of the future!









There were many opportunities to explore mathematics this week in Year 1; creating repeated patterns, imaginative people from 2D shapes, challenging tangrams, learning about the greater than, less than signs and working on number bond recall.
















Year 2 visited the wonderful Temper Temper Chocolate factory as part of our 'Chocolate' topic. We learnt about where cocoa beans come from and the ingredients that are added to create the chocolate that we know and love. We tasted different types of chocolate but we weren't a big fan of the dark chocolate as it was a little bit bitter!







Year 2 demonstrated some amazing agility in their PE lessons last week.







#### **Food Tech**

We were so excited to have the doors between our classrooms open for our first Food Tech lesson of the year! We learnt all about different food groups, why we need them and why we need to eat a healthy, balanced diet. After that, we worked as a whole year group to create a giant food pyramid and have even started thinking about where some of our favourite foods would go.







#### **Maths**

Miss Dancy and Mrs Nash's maths classes joined forces on Tuesday for a collaborative lesson. Miss Dancy's class taught their friends how to add without regrouping. They were so good, Mrs Nash's class all gave themselves a 10/10 for confidence at the end! It is one skill being able to do the maths but an entirely different one to be able to teach someone else how to do it.







### **Greek Day**

Year 3 had a fabulous day learning all about Ancient Greece. We learnt how to write in Ancient Greek letters and made masks to represent the Greek Gods. Can you spot any Gods or Goddesses you recognise? In the afternoon, we made Greek Temples from Lego showing excellent team work.















#### **Science**


The children were investigating how sound travels. Taking advantage of the lovely sunshine, they set up their experiment on the Baily terrace and investigated how the sound of a clap travels over different distances.







Year 5 students in DT have been designing **toy storage** for a child's bedroom and have now begun modelling prototypes of their ideas. They have started modelling their concepts in plasticine using art straws for reinforcement. They all worked really well turning their sketch ideas into 3D.


















Year 5 have started to learn about the Windrush Generation. We started with finding out where these people came from. The children were challenged with mapping the caribbean using lego.










### **Latin - Houses in Pompeii**

We have been learning about what it was like to live in Pompeii, specifically the style of houses belonging to wealthy people. We have learned that they were quite different in style to the modern homes that we know today. They had no gardens and were built right on the edge of the street. On either side of the front door, there were shops. From the outside, they did not look particularly nice! However, once you stepped through the ianua (front door), they were in fact large in size and very beautiful. There would have been a summer dining area, a marble pool to collect rainwater, marble floors inlaid with mosaics and walls painted in oranges, reds and blues, depicting the ancient Greek myths.


We studied the floorplan of a Pompeian house and then created a sketch of this in our books, labelling the different areas in both Latin and English. We also had lots of fun in the BOX, where we built our own Pompeian houses using Lego!

Year 7 boys enjoyed making pastry in their Food Technology Elective.






#### **Science**

Year 7 looked through microscopes after they made slides of onion cells and stained them with iodine. They are learning how to use a microscope and that a piece of onion tissue contains hundreds of identical cells.











### Year 8

#### **Geography**

During our lessons exploring China's population, the children were challenged to use lego to create a 3D population map of the various Chinese cities. This helped them visualise the fact that China's population is very unevenly distributed and extremely dense in many places.









### Year 8

#### **Maths**

Year 8 pupils combined their creative skills with their mathematical understanding to create an eclectic range of guides to explain the key concepts and formulae relating to area and volume.

Joe V presented his formulae from within a cuboid for a particularly inspired and engaging brochure. Chloe D, with a nod to techniques shared in the revision workshops, produced a very useful ring bound guide. Eddie I included some quiz questions and there were numerous clear extension examples for prisms and cylinders. George N extended this further with a truncated cone and a torus.











### **PSHE**

#### **Feeling Empowered**

In PSHE this term, how better to kickstart the school's 'Power of Me' theme than ensuring all children have the knowledge and the confidence to respond appropriately when an accident occurs. Children have become alert to potential hazards and how to call emergency services responsibly, ensuring they learn their postcode if they don't already know so!

This week, we put it all into practice and children in Years 3-8 learnt how to place a casualty in the recovery position and how to deliver CPR or instruct someone else. We hope they never have to use these skills, but understand the importance in knowing them.

#### The Children's Book Project

We are again running the collection of new and nearly new (but in very good condition) books for the Children's Charity in the run up to Christmas.



Across London and the UK, 1 in 4 disadvantaged children owns fewer than 10 books, whilst 1 in 8 has none at all. This has an impact not only on these children's academic outcomes but also on their wellbeing, emotional development and sense of themselves as a reader.

The Children's Book Project directly tackles this\_'book gap' and gifts donated books to targeted communities across the Capital. These schools and community groups put on celebratory book gifting events at which children are invited to choose a book to take it home and keep. The charity expects to gift upwards of 70,000 books this year.






