The children have enjoyed making a shape pirate ship and decorating their own mermaid with bubble wrap. They have also been looking at sinking and floating and counting pirate ships. The children had fun making a big treasure chest using different shiny pieces of paper. Fledglings 1 enjoyed dressing up as pirates and dancing to different kinds of pirate music. The children have had fun with feathers when making their own parrots. Fledglings 1 have enjoyed making their own pirate pizza treasure map using different ingredients. They have also been matching shapes to a pirate helm, listening to pirate stories and exploring boats and message in bottles water play.









### **Fledglings 2**

I'm late, I'm very late, it's time for tea! Fledgling's 2 have had lots of fun learning about Alice in Wonderland! The children have been busy with lots of cooking activities! They have enjoyed making their own heart shaped jam sandwiches and making yummy fruit kebabs too! There has also been lots of different messy play activities that the children have loved exploring, they have been making their own cups of tea, cupcakes with cotton wool, flour and sprinkles, furthermore, they have been mixing colours together in the water tray and making potions too! The children have also enjoyed matching colour bears to a chess board and have been counting all of the roses on a rose bush! The children have been really creative making their own heart shaped wands and decorating their own crowns too. They have also been visiting the wigloo where they listened to the story and went on a hunt for different coloured hearts. There have also been many opportunities to explore the White Rabbits magic hole into wonderland and have a tea party with Alice and her friends! And to end this fun filled week off, the children enjoyed dressing up as their favourite characters from the story!



#### **Lower Robins**

Over the past couple of weeks, our theme in Lower Robins has been Summer Holidays. The children have loved collaging using coloured materials and edible sprinkles to create their own ice lollies. We have also been using children's scissors to cut out pictures from holiday brochures and have used these to design our own postcards. The children have had lots of fun splashing in coloured water play in the garden and have been practising filling and emptying buckets in the water. We have also been exploring apple and peach scented cloud dough and have used this to make pretend ice creams to role play with our peers. At circle time, the children have taken part in group discussions about our favourite places to visit on holiday and what we like to do when we go on holiday.

In our Take Art sessions, the children took part in some large scale painting on paper, cling film and a cloth material. The children were encouraged to explore mark-making freely using a range of sponges, brushes and tools.



#### **Upper Robins**

Last week in Upper Robins the children really enjoyed learning about space and the different planets in the solar system. They have loved making rockets using different shapes incorporating a photo of their self inside the rocket on the way to the moon and they will also be sticking different body parts together to make their very own astronaut. Also, this week the children have enjoyed practicing their cutting skills to cut out the different planets, make their own moon using paint and foil to make a lovely texture on the moon and exploring our very own handmade moon sand with the rocket and different people. The Robins room and the Patterson hall has been filled with the sound of music and song with the Robins children preparing for their summer concert.

This week in Upper Robins we have continued to learn about the topic of space, the children have really enjoyed creating their own Aliens by using different coloured paint and a straw to blow the paint in different directions, creating lots of different shapes and mixing the colours together to create other colours. Also, this week the children have continued to learn about the different planets in space by creating their own planets using different sized balloons and paint, they have been counting rockets, finding the missing number in the sequence and recognising the numbers. The children have also particularly loved exploring our sensory space box by feeling the different textures and guessing what the object is. This has been full exciting events for the Robins children to take part in and watch. The first event of the week was our Robins summer concert which the children were very in excited to take part in, they children did exceptionally well with singing the songs and playing different instruments in front of all their family and friends. The Upper Robins children have also really enjoyed watching Skylarks dress rehearsal for their summer concert and to round off the week the children are looking forward in participating in different races on Friday for sports day!













### **Skylarks - Green**

Last week the Skylarks Green have been learning all about jungle animals and to extend their learning we looked at the book Handa's surprise. This book gave the children the opportunity to learn about different lifestyles, animals and fruits! The children really enjoyed tasting the fruits from the book!

This week the children have been learning about 'Pirates'. They have been making pirates hats and using the tea bags to design their treasure map. They have explored a tray that was set up with different treasures and sand, digging for treasure! We have also learnt facts about pirates and sang some songs about pirates and the children learned lots of pirate words, like crows nest, rigging, walking the plank, cutlass.



















### **Skylarks - Orange**

Another week of exploring the jungle has meant we have been on a jungle hunt! The children were given clues as to what the animal may look like or where it likes to live, they then had to think about where we may find them on the site such as the snake in the tree and the crocodile at the pond! The children each made their own snake either by cutting and painting a paper plate into a spiral or by making a paper chain!

Arrrrgh! The pirates in Skylarks had a fantastic time exploring the theme of Pirates this week! They have been dressing up, using maps to explore and weighing coconuts in the sand tray! We have all made our own pirate maps and a pirate dropped a special map to us so we could find some treasure! We had to follow the clues and look for numbers as we went, at the end we listened to a riddle that told us where to find the treasure and of course it was on the pirate ship!













### OAK

### **Reception Class**

For Perspective week, Oak answered the question, "Why is the world so special". Each class researched a different country based on the children in the classes. We looked at France, Tanzania and Sweden. We learnt about their geography, capital cities, animals, weather and even important people and events. Each class had an expert come in to teach us more! It was fantastic! On Friday, we shared our learning with Skylarks and the experts and showed everyone in Oak so we could answer the key question.

Oak had a delightful teddy bear picnic at Chestnut. The kids listened to a story about an old bear, and some of the teachers showed their bears. Afterwards, they had a teddy bear treasure hunt outside, which was related to emotions and was thoroughly enjoyed by the children. Then, they had a wonderful picnic on the grass in the Chestnut playground, and the bears enjoyed the lovely feast!

In our topic, we have been looking at our own journey. We have talked about the change from baby to toddler to child, and they have discussed what they are excited about when they are in Chestnut. The children shared pictures of themselves at those ages, and we wrote sentences about each photograph.













#### **Perspective Week**

During this immersion week focusing on perspectives, Year 1 were tasked with exploring the question: can kindness change the world? To delve deeper into this, the children explored what kindness means to them and researched other people who have shown kindness in a variety of ways throughout history and in the present day.

The pupils then found out that on the Friday of the immersion week, they would be hosting a Kindness Fair for the Year 1 pupils at Hurst Green Infant School to spread kindness in a range of ways and see if their kindness could change the world.

Throughout the week, Year 1 created: kindness acrostic poems, a kindness song with sign language, kindness cakes, kindness murals, random acts of kindness and a comparative survey to evaluate whether they had spread kindness to the pupils at Hurst Green Infant School.

It was a thoroughly enjoyable week and the Kindness Fair was the perfect showcase to demonstrate how kindness can be spread, and in so many different ways. The pupils at Hurst Green Infant School had an incredible time and felt very special after receiving so much kindness from the Hazelwood pupils. The week was finished by performing the kindness song they had written with Al Start to their parents, grandparents and carers in the glorious sunshine.

When reflecting on their week, the pupils in Year 1 thought they had a greater understanding of different ways to show kindness and the impact of it, and were able to answer their initial question: can kindness change the world? Happily, with an overwhelming, "yes!"



We chose a play that linked to our learning in science. Although rehearsals did take a little time from normal lessons, we:

- learnt our lines;
- practised expression and volume when speaking;
- concentrated on delivering our lines at the right time;
- worked as a team;
- made our own scenery;
- helped sort costumes;
- learnt new songs;
- listened carefully to instructions;
- enjoyed being actors.









### **Perspective Week**

During Perspective Week, the Year 3 children were posed with the following question: What is so great about the world? To start our project, we were visited by Mrs Claire Bowman. Mrs Bowman is the founder of 'Four Corners Travel', a travel agency with a focus on sustainable travel (<a href="https://www.fourcornerstravel.co.uk/">https://www.fourcornerstravel.co.uk/</a> / claire@fourcornerstravel.co.uk). Mrs Bowman spoke to the children about environmental damage caused by travel and some of the possible solutions. The children were fascinated by this topic and throughout the week they undertook extensive research on sustainable travel options. They learned about the unique features of 6 key travel destinations across the world and the need for their protection: Madagascar, The Great Barrier Reef, The Alps, Spain, Lyme Regis and The Lake District.

The children's learning encompassed a wide range of curriculum areas, e.g. in Maths, they analysed data on environmental damage in 6 popular tourist locations across the world, then created their own bar graphs to depict their findings. In Graphics, Mr Hayes helped the children to design and create their own posters and banners to market the different locations. In English, they used their persuasive writing skills to write travel leaflets to promote sustainable travel. Our week culminated in the Year 3 parents visiting the children's fabulous sustainable travel fair.










#### **Maths**

In Mrs Herbert's Maths class, students have been recapping all the topics they have learnt this term by creating their own board games with a range of differentiated questions to test the participants. Let's hope they finish them in time to play them next week!



#### **Paper Aeroplane**

Mrs Nash's maths group have taken the opportunity to create their own paper aeroplanes and discover how far they can make them fly with different designs. They have measured the distance flown down the corridors and will use this data to create graphs. We have also discussed what a good throwing angle might look like ... is it acute or obtuse?





#### **Prized Potato!**

After several weeks of religious watering, it was time to reveal which form in Year 4 had grown the most potatoes. Students rummaged carefully through the soil, extracting every prized potato and after a tense weigh-in, 4H emerged victorious! Perhaps the kitchen can use the potatoes to recreate our "A-peeling Potato Salad" from Perspective Week!







### **Bookends**

Year 5 tr have just completed their timber bookends. They have used mitre saws, coping saws. All hand made using excellent wood working skills. The have also created their own designs using inspiration from modern art

























#### **Structures**

The year 6s have been looking at structures in DT. Looking at frame structures and learning about triangulation.

We have discovered it is the strongest shape. So they were set the challenge to build the tallest, most attractive, well designed strong tower with 40 art straws and 2m of tape. They designed a structure in a team and then began to build in 45 mins.

They all worked well as a team across the year and considered where triangulation should be used to ensure their designs were successful and aesthetically pleasing.



### **Theatre Trip**

Year 7 travelled up to London by train to the Fortune Theatre to watch an incredible production by SplitLip theatre company.

It was a masterpiece in acting with beautiful songs sung in four part harmony. All five actors played over thirty five roles, switching between parts seamlessly. The way they moved props, sets and changed scenes in seconds was astonishing.

The play was a comedy take on the original film 'The man who never was' and it held our pupils attention all the way through.

The choreography was sharp and precise, the singing was fabulous, and they were very funny.

### **Perspectives Week**

Are my views my own? What or who influences me? How do I make decisions about fashion, food, hobbies, lifestyle? Whose perspectives do I rely on?

These were questions facing Year 8 pupils at the beginning of Perspectives Week. And whilst most are convinced that they are beyond peer pressure and cultural influence, Year 8 took on the challenge of trying to influence others and control their decision making.

Using Prime energy drinks as a model, we explored the marketing strategies of this controversial product to see if we could influence the rest of the school and create a marketing mania. Mrs Whitehead, Hazelwood's own Director of Marketing, gave a presentation sharing her experience and insight into creating a desirable brand and an effective campaign, whilst Mrs Fuller gave useful tips on packaging design. By the end of Day 1, Year 8 were split into three brownie-baking teams, each out to convince the rest of the school that their product was the most desirable, most delicious and most deserving of their support.

The race was on! Logos, slogans, use of colour, influencers, nets for packaging, poster designs, video adverts, in-person presentations, branded stickers, word of mouth pressure and the very persuasive scent of chewy chocolate brownies all combined to work their magic. The school was flooded with marketing methods, all with a healthy sense of rivalry. It was fascinating to note that by the end of Tuesday, many younger pupils had a very clear idea of the brownie they would choose - and why. And the brownies themselves were barely out of the oven!

On Wednesday, each group set up a presentation stall in a location of their choice, with bespoke tablecloths, balloons and posters using their colour themes. Brownies were sliced, packaged and ready to serve to their market audience. At 10.25 sharp, to the sound of bongo beats and catchy chants, excitable queues formed with pupils buzzing for their own taste of Brownie Boosters, Brownie Bites or Bicep Brownies. It was clear that Year 8 had successfully manipulated the views of the school into believing in the power of these brownies, and leaving many disappointed when one brand ran out. (The difference in the three recipes was negligible.) Mrs Philimore's team of market analysts surveyed younger pupils to find out about their decision making. Packaging had a strong influence on their choices, as did poster design. Location of stalls also had an impact, with the Baily Terrace proving a popular spot.

Beyond the project itself, the teamwork and collaboration skills of our eldest pupils proved impressive. They identified the need for a cross-section of characters and skill sets within their groups, and worked together in an extremely tight timeframe. The end product - a delicious brownie breaktime snack - was well baked, hygienically packaged and thoroughly enjoyed by the entire school, who were blissfully ignorant of the fact that they were guinea pigs in a social experiment.

So, are our views our own? We're not so sure! Year 8 swayed the school in only two and a half days!



**Tuesday 11th July - 9am-11am** - Uniform Drop off only.


All items you wish to receive monies for will need to be in a good clean condition and have a sales ticket completed and attached.






